12. OPEN THE DOOR FOR ELIJAH - ELIJAHU HA NAVEE

Traditionally the youngest children open the door for Elijah. Everyone joins in singing "Eliyahu Ha-Navi" and then the door is closed.

PASSOVER SEDER

Washing of Hands - Search for Leaven

The Seder starts with a washing of the hands after searching through the house to ensure there is no leaven. So we search our hearts for sin before approaching the Passover table. (Psalm 24: 3-4 Who may ascend into the hill of the Lord? Or who may stand in His Holy Place? He who has clean hands and a pure heart.)

1 Cor 5:6-8 Your boasting is not good. Do you not know that a little leaven leavens the whole lump? 7 Cleanse out the old leaven that you may be a new lump, as you really are unleavened. For Christ, our Passover lamb, has been sacrificed. 8 Let us therefore celebrate the festival, not with the old leaven, the leaven of malice and evil, but with the unleavened bread of sincerity and truth.

2. KARPAS – eat a green vegetable: Parsley – Brucha

3. HIDE THE AFIKOMEN

The middle matzah is broken, wrapped, hidden and found at end of meal (God is the rewarder of those who diligently seek him – the child who finds Afikomen is give a reward, usually money).

This tradition is done at every Passover Seder, but the obvious symbolism of the Body of Messiah - broken, wrapped in a burial cloth, hidden in the tomb and found in resurrection is not understood by most Jewish people celebrating the Passover. In some orthodox traditions the Afikomen is tacked to the ceiling. It is not understood why, but surely this pictures the ascension of Messiah! This symbology suggests that Messianic believers had an influence on the liturgy of the Passover meal as celebrated by Jewish families till very this day.

4. FOUR QUESTIONS

Why is this night of Passover different from all other nights of the year?

1. She-b'chol ha-lei-lot anu och'lin cha-meitz u-matzah. Ha-laylah hazeh kulo matzah.

On all other nights, we eat either leavened or unleavened bread, why on this night do we eat only matzah?

Why do we eat Maror? For the reason that the Egyptians embitter the lives of our ancestors in Mitzrayim, as the Torah states: "And they embittered their lives with servitude, with mortar and bricks without straw, with every form of slavery in the field and with great torment." (note at this time the haroset - the traditional fruit/nut paste is eaten - a reminder of the mortar and bricks)

9. THE SECOND CUP - BRUCHA

11. THE THIRD CUP - BRUCHA

Exodus 12:7 and 13

7 "Then they shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it.
13 The blood shall be a sign for you, on the houses where you are. And when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague will befall you to destroy you, when I strike the land of Egypt.

Matthew 26:26-27

26 And as they were eating, Jesus took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to the disciples and said, "Take, eat; this is My body." 27 Then He took the cup, and gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying, "Drink from it, all of you. 28 For this is My blood of the new covenant, which is shed for many for the remission of sins. 29 But I say to you, I will not drink of this fruit of the vine from now on until that day when I drink it new with you in My Father's kingdom."

8. THE THREE SYMBOLS

The Passover Haggadah that many Jewish families use makes reference to Rabbi Gamaliel who says that it is one's duty to explain the following three symbols at Passover. However, Gamaliel is mentioned in Acts 5...

34 Then stood there up one in the council, a Pharisee, named Gamaliel, a doctor of the law, had in reputation among all the people, and commanded to put the apostles forth a little space; 38 And now I say to you, keep away from these men and let them alone; for if this plan or this work is of men, it will come to nothing; 39 but if it is of God, you cannot overthrow it—lest you even be found to fight against God."

He was a wise rabbi indeed! Here are the three symbols as commanded in Numbers 9:11

1. THE PASSOVER OFFERING;

- Exodus 12:5 Your lamb shall be without blemish, a male a year old.
- John 1:29 The next day John saw Jesus coming toward him, and said, "Behold! The Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world!

2. THE MATZAH

- Exodus 12:8 They shall eat the flesh that night, roasted on the fire; with unleavened bread and bitter herbs they shall eat it.
- Striped and Pierced Isa 53:5b
- a)The chastisement for our peace was upon Him, b) And by His stripes we are healed.

3. THE BITTER HERBS

Isa 53:5a But He was wounded for our transgressions, He was bruised for our iniquities

The same traditional Haggadah also suggests that we should identify ourselves as if – "they themselves had come out of bondage." Each of us as believers in Messiah have a TESTIMONY of how we have been saved from the bondages of sin.

On all other nights, we eat vegetables of all kinds, why on this night must we eat bitter herbs?

On all other nights, we do not dip vegetables even once, why on this night do we dip greens into salt water and bitter herbs into sweet haroset?

On all other nights, everyone sits up straight at the table, why on this night do we recline and eat at leisure?

5. THE ANSWERS

The Answers to these questions are told in the story of the deliverance of the Children of Israel in Exodus 12 (READ verses 1-27).

Exodus 12:26-27 And when your children say to you, 'What do you mean by this service?' 27 you shall say, 'It is the sacrifice of the LORD's Passover.

6. THE TEN PLAGUES

These are the Plagues that the Holy One, blessed be He, brought upon Egypt. Tradition reenacts this by dipping one's finger into a glass of wine and flipping the drop of wine onto a plate.

Had He led us through it on dry land, and not sunk our foes in it, - Dayyenu

Had He sunk our foes in it, and not satisfied our needs in the desert for forty years, - Dayyenu

Had He satisfied our needs in the desert for forty years, and not fed us the manna, - Dayyenu

Had He fed us the manna, and not given us the Sabbath, - Dayyenu Had He given us the Sabbath, and not brought us to Mount Sinai, - Dayyenu

Had He brought us to Mount Sinai, and not given us the Torah, - Dayyenu

Had He given us the Torah, and not brought us into Israel, - Dayvenu Had He brought us into Israel, and not built the Temple for us, - Dayvenu

Though the Lord has given us such a great salvation through the death and resurrection of Messiah, "He has given us all things that pertain to life and Godliness"!
